From Our Minister

July Monthly Theme: Compassion

I began my sermon on Father's Day, only a few days after the shootings in Charleston, "A war is raging. Have you heard?" Since then, six predominantly black churches in four Southern states have been damaged or destroyed by fire.

This month, we are called to ponder "compassion." The Latin roots of that word are "to suffer" and "with." Have you ever suffered with someone? In that moment, their pain becomes yours. The divide that separates you from another disappears. For the past 30 years, the members and friends of South Valley have suffered with LGBTQ people and shared their concerns, working through obstacles into greater understanding. By becoming part of the change we wanted to see in the world, we have lived to witness the Supreme Court decision to support same-sex marriage in all the states of this union. On that day, I was asked to give a statement to the Salt Lake Tribune:

The Rev. Patty C. Willis of South Valley Unitarian Universalist Society, who is married to her longtime partner, Mary Lou Prince, expressed amazement and appreciation for the decision's "affirmation of the humanity of LGBTQ Americans." The ruling "gives meaning to the hard work and courage of those who risked everything to be wholly themselves," Willis said. "Through uncountable small and great acts of courage, our country has transformed."

I hope that many of you gather with us on July 1st in Millcreek Canyon for we need to mark these gains in freedom for all people. Yet, as we are celebrating, people are mourning the deaths in Charleston. Black churches all over this country are increasingly being targeted by acts of hatred. What do we do? This new gain in the Supreme Court affirms that we can make a difference. As we did with LGBTQ issues, I believe that the difference we will make must begin with the change of heart that comes with stirrings of compassion.

I saw the possibility of what we could do together during the UU General Assembly in Portland when our youth jumped to their feet to answer Cornel West's call to action. Dr. West had a way of bringing us into his life and his heart until we felt his suffering around the deaths in Charleston and all over this land. As the youth, I was moved by Cornel West's grief and wonder how we will take this spark of compassion into our lives. A week ago, I urged you to action and to ask the survivors what we could do. One of the first requests out of Charleston is to remember those who died. You can forget the name of the killer and not grace him with fame. Instead, the survivors ask us to remember the dead. We speak often of those mysterious words "spiritual practice." A spiritual practice that would bless this world in July of 2015 would be to remember those who died in Charleston, saying their names and then standing in silence with their families and community, as we do together during our meditation. Say the names out loud: State Sen., Rev. Clementa Pinckney, Cynthia Hurd; Tywanza Sanders; Sharonda Singleton; Myra Thompson; Ethel Lance; Susie Jackson; the Rev. Daniel Simmons Sr.; and DePayne Doctor. With each name, stand with the family who has lost a loved one. This time of meditation and prayer around these names is one way for us to grow our hearts big enough for the work that is in front of us to do.

Remembering the dead in Charleston is one step, another is to experience something that has happened right here in Utah. Three dates have been chosen by our Social Action Team to make a trek to Delta to support Rick Jones and his family who have been victims of hate crimes. Delta is also home to a museum about Topaz, a Japanese internment camp only 15 miles from Delta. The museum is now showing an exhibit of the art of Topaz. When you go to Delta, and I hope that you do, go to the museum and sit with the art work. You will feel your heart stir with compassion as you witness what racism did in this state. The Topaz Museum hours are 11:00 -5:00 every day except Sunday. 55 West Main, Delta, UT 435-864-2514. If you can't go on one of the dates with the Social Action Team and other church members, consider making a pilgrimage on your own. Lunch at the Jones' family's pizzeria and a visit to the museum and site of Topaz will stir your heart with compassion. As we have learned, compassion will generate the small and great acts of courage we need to make the world safe for all.

Since 1997 Great Salt Lake Audubon has been in the process of restoring 120 acres of riparian habitat located between 11100 South and 9800 South in South Jordan, Utah. Today, with development encroaching from all sides, this reserve is the longest protected section of the Jordan River. Volunteers of all ages from our church community have participated in five different field trips over the past 6 to this reserve, where we have planted and watered trees. Registration: We can have only 10 vehicles; and we can probably fit a few more vehicles in. No RV hookups. First paid/first reserved. Any vehicle is \$40.00. If you pre-pay you do not need a paid pass from the gate. There are no hookups/non-electric. Day use \$10.00. Covered main pavillion main area with fire pit(s). Anyone camping overnight must complete a **Reservation Form** and submit it to SVUU along with payment. We will pass the hat during the service.

Activities: Hiking trails. Timpanogos cave. Alpine loop drive. Cascade springs. Fishing in a few small lakes a short drive away or the creek. Potluck dinner Saturday night. Sunday service followed by a potluck lunch. Guitars, singers, board games, horseshoes, badminton, welcome.

Safety: High altitude (7000 feet), bright sun & cold fall nights! Bring sunscreen, bug dope, jacket, hat, gloves, etc. SVUU does not perform first aid. Children are the total and full responsibility and in the care of the parents/adults bringing them. Please consider the environment, use bio-degradable soap and pack out all trash. The forest service is requesting that you use local firewood, and not bring firewood in.

Campground/: Check in 3 PM Fri. out by 2 PM Mon. Tents can be spread thru-out. ADA accessible restrooms (sorry no showers this time). Dogs allowed/but must be leashed.
