From the Minister's Desk

When Lou's great-aunt Frieda, a wonderfully kind woman, went to a restaurant with her sisters, during the dinner she inevitably remarked, "I like the other place better." In the case of restaurants, she believed that there was another place where the food or service or atmosphere was better.

I have often met people who speak of other places that are better than the places where they are. When we first arrived in Japan, we met foreigners who told us, "The people in this part of Japan are closed minded and narrow. In Tokyo (or Kyoto or anywhere else), people are much more open and kind." It was easy to feel that way. Cultural differences offered an infinite number of chances for misunderstandings. It was easy to think that another part of the country would be better or another country entirely would be much more livable. Sometimes we slipped into that way of thinking and dreamed of living in Italy. Italy was our Promised Land where people ate our favorite kind of food and the sun was usually shining even in the winter. Then, one summer we took a trip to Italy for two months to scout out possible places to live. Everything went wrong. It rained almost every day. Our suitcases containing all our clothes were stolen from our rental car. The school where we planned to study Italian lost Mary Lou's registration and there was no teacher for her. The inn where we stayed in the countryside was under construction with drills and cement mixers starting up outside our window at seven. By the time those two months were over, we saw Japan differently. We valued our house and our village and the fact that we already spoke the language. We discovered that the Promised Land was not halfway across the world. It was right where we were. And we took that conviction with us to the Salt Lake Valley.

For Unitarian Universalists (and for Martin Luther King, Jr. and Mahatma Gandhi), the Promised Land is the Beloved Community. Instead of looking for a place in heaven, we find the possibility of heaven in our existing community. I have seen the Beloved Community at work in the preparation for and in the memorial service for Buddy Roach. People pulled together and gave of themselves and Sandra and her family generously received as well as gave to us. The Beloved Community is dynamic. We mourn together as we did in the service after the Connecticut massacre and we celebrate together as we did at the church auction. We assume good intentions when we do not understand one another's actions. We laugh and cry and dance together. Martin Luther King's Beloved Community was forged through the everyday acts of walking through the streets of Montgomery, Alabama, instead of riding the bus and much later walking step by step to Washington. Mahatma Gandhi's Beloved Community was built through marching to the sea to harvest salt and by hours spent spinning and weaving cloth. Strangers, gathered together by common purpose, transformed into Beloved Communities through ordinary acts that held both enormous meaning and risk.

During the month of January, before the chalice lighting in our worship services, we will be looking back on South Valley history. We have already been transformed by the ordinary, risky act of hanging a huge rainbow flag on the front of our building. As we celebrate our courageous past, what will we dream up for the future? What ordinary acts will lead us to our Promised Land?

REGAL – Religious Education, Growth & Learning

In January Religious Education swings back into full force! There's a lot going on this month and January tends to be a very high attendance month for us. We're starting off the month of January with an Intergenerational service about the 4th Wiseman. Then we leap into our social action pursuits, talking about compassion and caring for others. Community, compassion, coordinated action – all great ways to spend the dark, cold month of January.

The **preschool class** will have class as usual on January 6th during the intergenerational service. They'll be talking about the changes winter brings to the earth around us. On January 13th they'll be talking about fear and how everyone has something they are afraid of. On January 20 the lesson is called *People of All Colors are Important*, and on January 27 they'll explore how being angry doesn't mean you have to hurt someone.

The **Sacred Travels** class finishes up their exploration of our Second Principle – be kind in all you do – by learning about Clara Barton. Clara Barton was a Universalist who was a nurse during the Civil War. She snuck onto battlefields to care for wounded and dying soldiers on BOTH sides. Afterwards she created the American Red Cross to provide disaster relief both in this country and abroad. She exemplifies living our second principle and we're excited that the kids will get to learn more about her and the way she lived her life. Because of the Intergen on Jan 6th, Children's Chapel will be delayed a week and we will only have 2 weeks for workshops.

The **Coming of Age** class will continue their exploration of spiritual practices by experiencing spirituality in movement, and learning about different types of prayer. They'll continue their year-long social action project helping the Homeless Youth Drop-In Center. The Coming of Age Mentor program also kicks off in January with a mentor orientation on January 20th and a social gathering to introduce the mentors and their mentees on Sunday, January 27th.

The **High School** class will be discussing compassion and humility. They'll also be working on their year-long social action project: sexuality education advocacy. We're also going to be preparing to host the Mountain Desert District's Winter Youth Conference in February!

South Valley is lucky to be able to host the **Mountain Desert District Youth Ministry's Winter Conference** here at South Valley Feb 8-10 (the con ends before church starts on Sunday). The theme this year is Equality. Imagine youth from 10 congregations throughout the Intermountain West congregating at our church to attend workshops on equality, worship together, renew old friendships while making new ones, and form powerful connections with other UUs outside of our immediate area.

This is a great opportunity in particular for our large and enthusiastic youth group and the youth groups at First Church and Ogden, as it can be hard to get our youth to conferences in other states. Though the youth take a prominent role in the planning and mechanics of the conference, it does also take an effort from adults to help pull it off. Youth advisers, religious educators and volunteers, and parents from all the participating congregations take part in the orchestration of the conference, and over the next two months I'll be looking for people from our congregation to be youth sponsors (who attend the con with the youth), workshop leaders/coordinators, food coordinators, and to offer other types of support. If you think this amazing ministry is something you'd like to be interested in, please let me know.

Journey Guides & Workshop Leaders Needed

It's a short term commitment with huge rewards! Adult Religious Education (ARE)

January Adult Religious Education (ARE) classes:

BRANCHES - This small group ministry format gathering is similar to Evensong and Semi-Circle groups that have been held at SVUUS before. The Branches model is based on a group model used in many interfaith settings also called covenant groups. Gatherings create opportunities to practice listening with our whole selves and speaking from our own experience and authority. The format empowers members to speak from their authentic selves, broadens our capacity to relate to multiple views on the themes, deepens connections among the members and offers an opportunity for each member to experience being fully heard. All are welcome to attend the **2-hour open session after service on January 6th**. Afterwards, groups will be established to meet monthly through July, probably on Sunday afternoon and Monday evening.

ROOTS - This is a new, 3-part series about UU principles and history and an overview of SVUUS to build strong UU "roots." It is appropriate for those new to SVUUS as well as long-standing members wanting to revisit this essential discussion. **Classes will be held after service on January 13th, 20th, and 27th, 12:30**


Cafe Justo COFFEE Sale - Addressing Immigration Issues at their Root


From the Library Committee

An Introduction to the Unitarian and Universalist Traditions

How is a free faith expressed, organized and governed? How are diverse spiritualities and theologies made compatible? What might a religion based in reason and democracy offer today's world? This book will help the reader to understand the contemporary liberal religion of Unitarian Universalism in a historical and global context. Andrea Greenwood and Mark W. Harris challenge the view that the Unitarianism of New England is indigenous and the point from which the religion spread. Relationships between Polish radicals and the English Dissenters existed, and the English radicals profoundly influenced the Unitarianism of the nascent United States. Greenwood and Harris also explore the US identity as Unitarian Universalist since a 1961 merger and its current relationship to international congregations, particularly in the context of twentieth century expansion into Asia.
