From the Minister's Desk -- Faith and Dry Beans

Today, I spent a couple of hours at the Crossroads Urban Center on 400 East. As I sat there, waiting for Linda Hilton, several people came in to pick up food or to ask questions. On a tour of the building, I saw volunteers in the back pantry preparing packages of food according to the living situation of the client. Along with packages for people who have kitchens, some packages are prepared for people who live in places where they cannot cook. Others are prepared for people who live outdoors. When we walked around the corner to a place where we ate lunch, I put on my long, warm, down coat. How do people survive with no roof above them for the night? As I sat in the waiting area, I thought of our connection to Crossroad's mission: the food basket that we keep in the entryway of our church for Crossroads. When I walked out of my office to make sure that it was still there, there it was, full of food! This month because of shortages, they have named dry beans as their "Food of the Month." I hope that we have so many dry beans in that basket that we have to take the contents down to Crossroads early and fill it up again.

What do dry beans have to do with our monthly worship theme of faith? I wonder if you see the same people that I do when I drive around this city. They are holding signs asking if I have anything to give them or they are standing by a heaped up grocery cart or they are sitting in the snow bank of a public park. If you feel as helpless as I do, then take a leap of faith that there are other people working to relieve this suffering and bring dry beans to our sanctuary. The volunteers at Crossroads will see that they reach the right hands. An offering such as a basket full of dry beans will spread the hospitality of our Cottonwood Café far beyond Highland Drive. On February 14th, from 9 a.m. to noon, you will have more chances to make a difference on Capitol Hill at the Unitarian Day at the Legislature. Let's take a leap of faith that we can make a difference!

My ministerial colleague in California told me that as a minister I had to be able to talk with you about everything. And, in the month of February, as we launch our pledge drive, that must include talk of money. Money is one of the resources, along with our gifts and talents, which this community needs in order to thrive. I like to give money for something I believe in. What do you believe in? What makes it easier to give? For years, this congregation has been creating a place of hospitality in the greater community. For many, that welcome has been life-saving. In my sermon on January 13th, I spoke of those times when we become strangers to ourselves. There may be times when this community is life saving for you. I hope that it will always be life-giving. In order to flourish, this congregation needs enough funds to support full-time ministry, keep this building repaired and even spiffed up, support religious education, and so many other dreams that will be voiced during our pledge drive! We invite you to voice yours too! During the past five months with you, I have seen glimpses of that Promised Land in which we are engaged in transformation. As individuals and as a congregation, we are becoming kinder and more peace-loving, more likely to reach out our hands to strangers, and more likely to fill baskets with dried beans next month! As we say each week: Together we share the wealth of this community and sustain it with our gifts. Consider if you're in a position to share more.

Being invited to join this eight-week program was perhaps the most welcoming gesture given to me when my family first started attending South Valley. Perhaps Roots will have a like impact on you or some of our visitors just starting to explore South Valley. We must be sure we invite them to participate in this process along with the Circle Suppers each month. We may never know or appreciate the impact such an invite might have in the life of a fellow seeker. We learned that the difficult part of being a Welcoming community is to first be a welcoming person, to be at home with yourself. Remembering the Evensong program also brings back the memory of a prayer or mediation that was also part of our church life at the time. To me this is a call to be a welcoming person. (If someone knows the author, please help us give proper credit.)

REGAL – Religious Education, Growth & Learning

Wow, can you believe it's February already? Well, I'm writing this in January, and January seems like it's been going on for 17 years, but I know that soon it really will be February and I'll be thinking "Wow, can you believe it's February already? This year sure is flying by!" (This is me thinking positively!) Despite the length of these cold, bitter January days, there's so much to do to prepare for this spring, I wish there were more time all around. I just wish it were less cold. Anyway, jumping right in with what's going on in February...

On February 3rd **the preschool class** will be learning about wishes and how some of them really CAN come true. Then they'll be learning about the Chinese New Year on February 10, and how love involves words AND actions on February 17. Finally, on February 24, they'll be learning about how there are many different kinds of families, and they all involve sharing and caring.

The **Sacred Travels classes** start exploring our 3rd Principle: We believe we should accept one another and keep on learning together. This month's book is called *Emily*, by Michael Bedard. In this fiction book, a small girl befriends Emily Dickenson, despite Emily's reticence and the rumors of her strangeness that the other community members spread. We'll be talking about how it's important to form your own opinions about others, and that people who are different from us have important things to share. Also, in Children's chapel, the kids will be putting together first aid kits to donate to The Road Home as a way to finish up January's unit on Clara Barton.

The **Coming of Age class** gets to know their mentors better in February, while exploring UU values, good and evil, and how to talk about Unitarian Universalism with people who are not Unitarian Universalist.

There is a LOT going on for the **High School class** in February. We're hosting the District's youth conference Feb 8-10 and quite a few of our youth are involved in planning and helping pull it off. Outside of the Con, the High School class will be talking about courage and continuing to work on their advocacy project for Sexuality education.

South Valley is lucky to be able to host the Mountain Desert District Youth Ministry's Winter Conference here at South Valley Feb 8-10 (the con ends before church starts on Sunday). The theme this year is Equality. Imagine youth from ten congregations throughout the Intermountain West congregating at our church to attend workshops on equality, worship together, renew old friendships while making new ones, and form powerful connections with other UUs outside of our immediate area.

This is a great opportunity in particular for our large and enthusiastic youth group and the youth groups at First Church and Ogden, as it can be hard to get our youth to conferences in other states. Though the youth take a prominent role in the planning and mechanics of the conference, it does also take an effort from adults to help pull it off. Youth advisers, religious educators and volunteers, and parents from all the participating congregations take part in the orchestration of the conference, and over the next two months I'll be looking for people from our congregation to be youth sponsors (who attend the con with the youth), workshop leaders/coordinators, food coordinators, and to offer other types of support. If you think this amazing ministry is something you'd be interested in, please let me know.

Journey Guides & Workshop Leaders Needed

It's a short term commitment with huge rewards! Adult Religious Education (ARE)

February Adult Religious Education (ARE) classes:

The January open session was a success and two separate groups will form in February to meet through July; one group will meet Sunday afternoons and the other will meet Monday evenings. There is one more opportunity to join this small group ministry format gathering: the February gatherings will be open to those wanting to come and find out if they want to join. The Branches model is based on a group model used in many interfaith settings also called covenant groups. The format empowers members to speak from their authentic selves, broadens our capacity to relate to multiple views on the themes, deepens connections among the members and offers an opportunity for each member to experience being fully heard. All are welcome to attend either open session on February 24th and February 25th. These two groups will continue through July and then the process of an open session followed by group formation will start over this fall.

Myers-Briggs Workshop - Brenda Voisard, Ph.D. (bvoisard@comcast.net), Saturday, February 16th, 10:00 a.m. to noon

The Myers-Briggs Type Indicator (MBTI) is a tool designed to measure how people perceive the world and make decisions. It is frequently used in professional development, leadership training, and team-building exercises. It is one method to provide participants insight into their personal preferences and ways of interacting. This workshop is open to all but would be of particular interest to current and potential SVUUS leaders. The first 15-30 minutes will be spent taking and scoring the MBTI, and then the class will receive information to understand the results, and finally there will be some group exercises to see how this plays out in interactions. Join us for two hours of fun and insight downstairs in the Social Hall.
