From the Minister's Desk – Beginning Again in Thanks

Spring offers my spirit a chance each year to renew itself. I chose "gratitude" as the theme for May because during this month gratitude bubbles up inside me when I wake up and hear birds singing and watch spring flowers appearing one after another and the trees leafing out and creating shade. Spring reminds me of the first source of Unitarian Universalist faith: Direct experience of that transcending mystery and wonder, affirmed in all cultures, which moves us to a renewal of the spirit and openness to the forces which create and uphold life. Have you had such an experience of transcending mystery and wonder? I do when I open my window about halfway up Millcreek Canyon and breathe in the scent of mountain stream and forest and when I walk along the trails of our national parks. My senses are awakened and I am right in the moment, without worries about what has just happened or what lies on the road ahead. My spirit fills to overflowing and I am renewed. As the world turns towards its own renewal, I encourage you to seek ways to renew yourselves.

For each of us, that process of renewal is different. And each of us needs that renewal. This is one of those hidden aspects and one of the keys to the success of our shared ministry. In seminary, teachers stress the need for self care. It is wonderful and life-giving to do things for others, to care for and inspire people, to do the work that all of us do to support this community. Yet, the kind of care that all of us need in order not to burn out does not come from that work, it comes from within. In order to continue giving, we must identify the source that renews us and maintain access to it. Just like my electric car needs to be plugged in at night, we all need to regularly connect with our source for renewal in order to keep running. Could this be our next work—to find that source and a practice that connects us with that source on a regular basis?

This was easy for me before we moved here. All I had to do was look out my window at the olive tree that was full of nesting quail and hummingbirds or up at the Milky Way that seemed to stretch just above our desert home. I've had to get re-oriented here and this is what I've come up with: I'm going to make sure that I spend time outside every day even if it is just sitting under a tree and looking up at the leaves or digging into the earth around some plant in our garden. I'm going to stick my nose into a flower at least once a day and breathe in. I'm going to take one of those easy hikes in Millcreek Canyon once a week and before I go to bed, instead of looking at emails, I'm going to walk out my door and see if I can spot a star. When I hear the birds in the morning, I'm going to lie there for a couple of minutes and listen to them. I'm also going to try to notice the stage of the moon each night.

The committees and my office have been buzzing with exciting ideas for the next church year. The best way to prepare is to find your way to the source of your energy and establish a regular connection! Let's share ideas about what we find.

Brenda Voisard – Leadership Succession Committee

Brenda Voisard, Ph.D. has been a member of SVUUS for 24 years. She and her partner, Maureen, were married by SVUUS Minister Rev. Barbara Bush (now Rev. Barbara Hamilton-Holway) in 1990 in a ceremony later featured in the Salt Lake Tribune "Religion" section. Brenda was REGAL Coordinator at the time, and has since served on the worship committee, twice on the Board, chaired the Big Event for several years, worked with the Welcoming Congregation, been a choir member, taught adult education classes around social justice issues and brought facilitators from the Inclusion Center to early social justice meetings. Maureen and Brenda have taught Jr. High and Sr. High classes for a number of years now, and appreciate the opportunity to interact with people of all ages and walks of life that our congregation brings. For the last year, Brenda has been completing a term for another member of the Leadership Succession Committee, and is appreciative to now be nominated for a full term. She has "drunk the KoolAid" of UUism for quite awhile now, and of SVUUS in particular, and believes in the opportunity the congregation provides for leadership learning and development and in the amazing leaders we have had and will have at SVUUS.

Bonnie Kaufman – Endowment Committee

SVUUS has been my church for more than 26 years. I've been a self-employed Realtor for 36 years and deal with financial issues daily. I'm still actively doing real estate work both in the Salt Lake area and also around Torrey near Capitol Reef and Boulder Mountain in Wayne County.

Several years ago I and a few other long-time members encouraged the church to establish an Endowment Fund instead of sending all donations to be used for the annual budget. Not only did we encourage... we INSISTED that certain of our donations be deposited into a separate account to grow for the future of the church. That separate account was small with just a couple of thousand dollars in it. At that time, I was working with Pete Williamson on the Budget Committee and also helping him with several real estate transactions. I asked him if he would consider leaving some of his properties to the church. Pete agreed and changed his Will to include SVUUS with the gift of two houses. After his death, and after quite an interesting series of events, I was finally able to get those two homes sold and the funds into the church brokerage account. Pete's generous gift, added to the previous member donations, totaled \$425,000 and became the base of our current ENDOWMENT FUND.

I would like to continue to serve on the Endowment Committee as one of the "proud parents" to guide this fund to fuller maturity. (And I encourage all of you members and friends to make donations to this important endowment to the future of our congregation. The larger the total of the fund, the more that can be given back to the church each year from fund earnings.)



From the Transition Team -- An Attitude of Gratitude

More and more I am seeing and hearing a phrase that I think bears repeating. All around us people are asking us to go through life with 'an attitude of gratitude'. As we embark on a new month, and Spring is in full bloom around us, remembering to look at our lives through the lenses of gratitude is a wonderful and fulfilling idea.

Tree Utah and Great Salt Lake Audubon have partnered to restore a section of the Jordan River to its undeveloped condition by recreating wetlands, controlling exotic vegetation, and re-establishing native trees and shrubs. This reserve is a crucial stopover for hundreds of thousands of migrating birds. This visionary project began in 1997 and demonstrates great faith in the future of our planet and the quality of life for future generations here in Salt Lake Valley. Tree Utah has planted over 60,000 native tree and shrub seedlings already.

We will help by planting trees and shrubs and installing protection around sensitive trees. The site is located in Salt Lake Valley between 98th and 111th South and encompasses ~120 acres. 
Come downstairs to the Social Hall every Sunday after the service to purchase grocery card coupons to Smith’s, Harmon’s, and Sprouts Markets.
