## From the Minister's Desk

### Where Can We Find Wisdom?

By the time you read this, we will have had a "Community Chat" which means that you will have heard about many of the plans for this church year. During my internship, my mentor, Rev. Walt Wieder gave me this wisdom: Surprised people act badly. Following his advice, I have decided to hold these community chats every couple of months to give committees, the Board and me, the opportunity to introduce ideas that are brewing that might mean change and ask for your input. Keep an eye out for these chances to get together and talk. They will be an enjoyable way for us to exchange ideas and also avoid surprises. One of my sources of wisdom has definitely been my mentors and elders.

I hope, also, that by the time you read this each of you, singly or in a group, is actively engaged in our Adopt-a-Space program and that our grounds are looking loved and welcoming. If you haven't had a chance to join a group yet, then please contact Jeff Hansen. He is ready to show you where your energy can move us towards being a more beautiful and therefore more welcoming presence in the South Valley.

Another source of wisdom will be opening up this month on Monday evenings in the form of "Monday Menus." The first class, on September 9th, that Mel Gunderson and I will be team teaching is the course The Artist's Way by Julia Cameron. This book and course has been a source of wisdom for me for over 15 years. A series of exercises and many wise quotations offer a way to explore your talents. During class time, we'll share our progress and do exercises that will deepen our exploration. This series led the way to many creative projects towards social action and helped me to develop a spiritual practice. Keshav and Leslie Sarin have kindly agreed to share their gifts with us and teach drumming and African dance. These classes will happen concurrently and not on the days we have The Artist's Way. I am excited for this chance for all of us to join together without words. Our children's choir will begin on September 8th during these adult classes. This will give the children many more opportunities to participate in our worship services.

This congregation has benefited from the wisdom of many people through the years. Both lay leaders and ministers have left legacies that are part of who we are today. One of these is the program "Evensong" that was written and developed by Rev. Barbara Hamilton-Holway when she served this congregation. Since this program was so formative to many members, skilled facilitators, Antoinette Rahman and Brenda Voisard, have decided to offer it again. This is a good chance for anyone who hasn't previously taken this course to deepen their connections with the community through sharing. Either Brenda, Antoinette or anyone who has attended in the past will be glad to sit down with you and tell you about the class.

On September 15th, our worship service will honor the high holy Jewish holiday of Yom Kippur. This is just the beginning of our interfaith services. This year you can look forward to Muslim, Hindu and Buddhist holy days. By bringing these traditions into our worship services, we will be supporting the study that our junior high schoolers are beginning as they visit churches, synagogues and mosques around the city. Let us open our minds and hearts to the wisdom that their interfaith adventures will bring back to us.

I hope that this month we will find much wisdom that will light the way ahead.

## From the Board of Trustees

Greetings from the Board!

Now, raise your hand if you're excited to hear about this year's Board retreat. Okay, those in the back who didn't raise their hands are probably wondering "What does this have to do with me"? Well, I'm glad you asked.

For the first two hours the Board met with the committee chairs at Cynthia Dobb's house. We started off the festivities with a presentation from the Leadership committee (Lorri Quigley presenting). It actually was quite good with lots of multimedia and audience interaction. Lorri provided a number of helpful hints about how to present a non-anxious presence. It turned out later that the hint most commented on was, "Good leaders know how to hide their panic."

Next was a presentation from Scott Smith of the Communications committee. Scott talked about the new Google Apps tools that will be available to members and committees at South Valley. The possibilities really are exciting. Each committee can have a listserv group, members will be able to call a committee phone number which will automatically generate a text email and send it to the committee chairman. Email to the committee email box will be able to be seen by all committee members ensuring a swift response. If that scares you, don't worry! Scott is an effective and competent communications leader who will hold South Valley by the hand and lead us into the 21<sup>st</sup> century (with a non-anxious presence).

Rev. Patty and Laura Renshaw led a discussion to help us envision what South Valley could be like in the coming year and in the coming years. This is high-level stuff but it's always good to get an idea of where you're going on a journey.

Next, Brenda Voisard gave the board a mental health exam. Not really, it was actually a personality styles assessment (the Myers-Briggs type indicator) and Brenda showed us how different personality types can work synergistically to produce a stronger result.

We then launched into a discussion of the South Valley Mission Statement and how to help our members know how the work they do at South Valley is part of our shared ministry and contributes directly to the overall mission of the church. The Board worked on developing a short, abbreviated version of the mission. We struggled for some time on how to encapsulate the core assets of South Valley, values such as acceptance, love, service, community and the way South Valley can help those in transition come to a more peaceful, loving and optimistic place in their lives. However, while the concepts were clear we had difficulty finding the right words. Finally we settled on some words from our welcoming message repeated at every service. Those words capture the idea that South Valley is a place of:

"An open mind,  
A loving heart,  
and willing hands."

That brought us to a place of unanimous agreement.

So, for those in the back of the room who didn't raise their hands here is what all of this means to you: we have trained leadership, an excellent new communication system and a vision for the future. And the vision is, in a nutshell, phrases you hear every week about the open mind, the loving heart and willing hands. And, of course, the full mission statement is on the back of the order of service each week.

Our Water Ceremony and Ingathering Sunday are joining together this year on September 8th as we come back from our summer adventures. ## Social Action Committee

### CLEAR THE AIR CHALLENGE - Our South Valley Team Results

Over 7,000 Utah commuters came together during the month of July for the 5<sup>th</sup> *Clear the Air Challenge* to reduce would-be air pollution across the Wasatch Front. This year was South Valley's third year to participate and our 12-member team, "South Valley Unitarian Universalists", collectively saved 5,478 miles, 536 trips, and 60 pounds of emissions! We made our impact by linking single-vehicle trips together (trip chaining), teleworking, compressing our work weeks, carpooling, walking/riding bikes, and using mass transit.

Our top performers and their total miles saved were: Lyn Worthen (1,568 miles), Rosane Coleman (1,427 miles), Nathaniel Coleman (954 miles), and Paul Barron (415 miles). Way to go Team!

Consider joining us next year and help us "walk-the-walk" of our 7th UU principle.

### Tapestry of Faith Curriculum

**Butterflies (Preschool):** Celebrating Me & My World by Debora Chandler Pratt

This class offers experiences and opportunities for kids to grow in their sense of trust and caring and to develop their self-identity and sense of connectedness with all of life.

**Pathfinders (K-1st Graders):** Wonderful Welcome, A Tapestry of Faith Program by Aisha Hauser and Susan Lawrence

Leaders and children alike explore how and why we are willing to welcome others into our lives. We welcome not only strangers, but family, our peers, our neighbors and even entities that are not people such as our animal friends and nature itself.

**Trailblazers (2nd-3rd Graders):** Faithful Journeys, A Tapestry of Faith Program by Alice Anacheke-Nasemann and Lynn Ungar Susan

Participants embark on a pilgrimage of faith, exploring how UU-ism translates into life choices and everyday actions, to discover a unity of faith in the many different ways Unitarian Universalists, including themselves, can act on our beliefs.

**Seekers (4th-5th Graders):** Toolbox of Faith, A Tapestry of Faith Program by Kate Tweedie Covey

What tools does Unitarian Universalism offer for the challenges of life? Children discover what aspects of UU faith are helpful to them, developing a toolbox of faith.

**Junior High (6th-8th Graders):** Neighboring Faiths

Sessions explore the beliefs, history, and development of different faith traditions, highlighted by field trips to see how and where those religions are practiced in our community. This group will cover Ancient Belief Systems, Hinduism, Buddhism, Judaism, Christianity, Islam, Earth-Centered Traditions, and New Religious Movements.

**High School (9th-12th Graders):** A Chorus of Faiths, A Tapestry of Faith Program by Renee Ruchotzke and Hannah McConnaughay

High school youth will also study World Religions, and participate in the field trips of Neighboring Faiths, but they will expand upon their knowledge of other religions by learning about and practicing interfaith communication and service, culminating in an interfaith social action project.



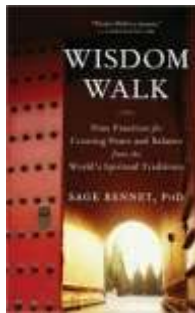
## Library Committee

This year in our Beacon articles, we will try to highlight materials from our library that support the theme of the month. This month the theme is Wisdom and we have found an interesting book in our collection we think you will enjoy.

### Wisdom Walk by Sage Bennet



After experiencing her own crisis of faith, Sage Bennet developed an eclectic spiritual life, borrowing rituals from many religions and traditions. In *Wisdom Walk* she outlines some of the most powerful of those practices, making them accessible to contemporary readers without diminishing or disrespecting their subtle nuances. Drawing from Hinduism, she explains how to create a home altar as a reminder of a larger spiritual presence. She explores how Buddhist meditation helps one find peace. From Islam comes surrendering to prayer, and from Christianity the practice of forgiveness. There's even Native American spirituality in the form of a chapter on letting nature be one's teacher. A final, summarizing chapter, brings together all the traditions, demonstrates their fundamental unity, and discusses the importance of offering oneself in service to others. *Wisdom Walk* provides a simple, easy-to-follow guide for bringing the world's spiritual traditions into one's life through practical,

powerful rituals.

## Update from the Facilities Team

The Solar Project application has been submitted to Rocky Mountain Power as of May 31, 2013. We have apparently made the first cut; however, that is no guarantee of funding. As far as the outcome of the application, a decision will be made on or before November 15, 2013.



Tucker is studying the numbers for our electric bill which reflect the kilowatts used. She is doing this to determine what is causing the meter to rise above 16 kilowatts as this is when we receive a peak demand charge which is ultimately costing SVUU \$600 annually. Based on when the peak demand charge occurs, the cause is not clear. She will continue her investigation and report back to the committee once she had more information.

Efforts continue to be made around parking lot improvements. Cody Pace is looking into getting bids from companies. We are also looking at getting some of the worst spots cut out and filled as we receive money from our PAVE RAVE Fundraiser. All the more reason to donate and attend out next PAVE RAVE coming up on September 13<sup>th</sup>! James suggested temporarily repairing the parking lot with five volunteers from SVUU. He has the knowledge and could retain the necessary tools to complete such a project. This is a good option if we can get enough people to volunteer to help out.

The committee discussed the heating and cooling system. Discussion centered on the possibility of obtaining a gas furnace for the annex before the cold weather hits. Goal is to make a decision and purchase furnace by the end of August.

The social hall lighting has been replaced with T8's. This will significantly improve the quality of light and will be on the natural spectrum. We will receive a 50% rebate, leaving the total cost to SVUU at \$1035. That money has already been raised through the Split-the-Plate offering incentive. Way to go, SV! This will save us money on lighting cost for the Social Hall, kitchen and bathrooms.

Robyn has placed all of our green recycling bins.. The bins have a list and picture on them to direct people as to what goes where. Due to safety it was decided glass would not be recycled. Watch for those bins and please be mindful of where your recycled items go.



We are looking into getting ceiling fans for the Sanctuary. So far the quote we have is way out of reach for our budget, and the committee will continue to investigate other options.

We are starting an "Adopt-A-Space" program. We will be dividing up all of the outdoor property and asking for volunteers to adopt that space and maintain it.
