So, please bring your furry or slippery friends for a blessing of health and happiness at 10 a.m. The next day, our intergenerational worship service will deepen our celebration of animals with stories and songs.

On October 18th and 19th Friday evening and Saturday, we have a rare and wonderful opportunity for fellowship with other Unitarian Universalists at the Cluster Meeting that will be held at First Unitarian church. From the Worship Closet

As we begin our new church year, you have probably already noticed a few new things with regards to worship. While some things are only 'experiments' other changes are more permanent. But we feel they are changes for the better.

One such is the addition of John Bennett, the tall man at the piano on the Sundays the choir sings. John is also the accompanist for Lou Prince's Senior Choir that was featured in an article in the Salt Lake Tribune in September. I happen to have met John a few times when he was still the Director at a Senior Center near downtown SLC. He is a great guy and I know he will welcome getting to know everyone here at SVUUS. Be sure to stop by the piano some Sunday and introduce yourself and make him welcome. His gift of music is one that will, hopefully, be given to South Valley for quite some time.

Another new addition is that of our Community Tree, which was introduced at the Water Ceremony/In-gathering Sunday in September. The Worship Committee and REGAL already have plans to use this tree as a community symbol several times during the year. We are looking for a very nice pot to put it into, and if anyone is so moved, we will gladly accept the donation of a worthy receptacle for our new community symbol.

Because of the tree, and for other reasons, the Worship Committee is also experimenting with changing the location of the pulpit and altar on the platform. This is a work in progress and we will just have to see how it will work out. Comments are welcome, but be advised that we need to keep it one way for awhile before trying it another way.

Our other experiment is jointly with the Facilities Team. In an effort to possibly reduce our electrical usage, we will be experimenting (on clear days) with using natural lighting only during at least part of the service. If anyone has problems seeing during service, we want your feedback. We will be trying out different methods to reduce electrical use for the next couple of months, again, all dependent on the weather. Your comments to us or to Tucker Gurney are appreciated.

The Worship Committee just wants people to understand that because something is changed it does not mean it is going to stay that way. This is a year of experimentation. Your comments and helpful suggestions are always welcome. If you want to be a part of the committee and help make changes that YOU would like to see, please contact any committee member at any time before or after service or by phone or email. We are actively looking for members. Newer members/friends are especially welcome. There will be a 'training session' in the fall, so watch for announcements.

From the Transition Team

“The Desire to Participate”

Rev. Patty has many strengths when it comes to ministry, but one in particular has to do with her style of sermonizing. She is a gifted storyteller. Time and again we are treated to a story that is often not only delightfully entertaining, but deeply and wonderfully meaningful. As a salute to Rev. Patty’s story-telling style, and in keeping with the season of Yom Kippur, this article begins with a story. This is from the Jewish tradition of Kabbalah, as related in The Way by Michael Berg (I am condensing and paraphrasing):

At the back of a crowded synagogue, a boy of five stood with his father. The little boy looked around and saw everyone concentrating very hard on their prayers. Caught up in the spirit of the congregation, he yearned, more than anything, to join in, to show his devotion. With this in mind, the boy opened a prayer book. But not yet knowing how to read, the words were meaningless scribbles and tears of frustration welled up. His nose began to run, so he reached into his pocket for a handkerchief. There in his pocket, wrapped in the handkerchief, was a beautiful shiny whistle.

The boy had a flash of inspiration. “If I blow this whistle very hard, God will hear it, and He will know how much I want to be with Him.” The boy put the whistle to his mouth, and in a synagogue filled with only the quiet murmurs of a hundred devoted supplicants, he blew the whistle as hard as he could.

Everyone nearly jumped out of their skins. The boy’s father, shocked and mortified, grabbed the whistle, glared at the boy and began to stammer an apology. He was interrupted by the well-known and kindly voice of the rabbi, who making his way through the crowd, approached the boy and said, “Why did you blow that whistle?” “I wanted to talk with God like everybody else.” The rabbi turned to the boy’s father and said, “I want you to know that your son’s blowing of that whistle opened more gates to the Creator than I could with all my knowledge and prayers and meditations. Thank you.”

There are many teachings embedded in this story, but the one that leaps out at me is the pure, overwhelming desire of that little boy to participate in the spirit of his religious community. He sensed that something wonderful was happening; he responded to that spirit of communion with the Holy in the way that he could in the moment. It wasn’t the usual way to participate; but perhaps being unusual, it was very effective in getting the attention of both God and everyone else in the room. Thankfully, the rabbi could remind those present that there are many ways to participate. What matters is not the way, but the desire and the gift that comes from the heart.

In the spirit of shared ministry, together with Rev. Patty and all those called to leadership in the South Valley UU Society, may we all find ways to transform our desire to participate into some kind—indeed, any kind—of contribution to the work of our Beloved Community. There is so much good work to be done, and there are a myriad of opportunities. Go for it! All that is required, in the words of Wiccan author Dianne Sylvan, is to “do what you can with what you’ve got.” (from The Circle Within)

Compassionate Service Opportunity: Meals for Homeless Youth

We are starting up a new program to help support homeless youth right here in Salt Lake Valley. We are looking for volunteers to help prepare and serve hot meals at the Homeless Youth Resource Center, possibly prepare food the day before, and/or donate food or funds to help purchase food for the meals. Beginning in October we will be serving breakfasts and dinners on the first Mondays and the 4th Fridays of each month (beginning Oct 7 and 25). We will organize into teams of 4 to prepare and serve meals at the center. The HYRC is located at 655 S. State Street, and time slots for preparing and serving at the center are 8:45 - 10 am for breakfasts and 3:45 - 5:15 pm for dinners. We will have an orientation at the HYRC very soon, date and time TBA.
